Statistics for February-March 2003

Sales and Redemptions

Total assets for all funds decreased in February by \$65.8 billion, or 1.0 percent, to \$6.27 trillion. Money market funds had a net cash outflow of \$39.6 billion compared to an inflow in January of \$1.2 billion. Other funds (equity, hybrid, and bond) had a net cash inflow of \$8.6 billion, compared to an inflow of \$13.7 billion in January. New sales of nonmoney market funds, the purchase of new shares excluding reinvested dividends, were \$92.5 billion in February, down from \$118.3 billion in January. The value of non-money market assets depreciated by \$40.3 billion in February, following a depreciation of \$75.5 billion in January.

Total assets of **equity funds** decreased by \$59.2 billion, or 2.3 percent, to \$2.54 trillion. There was a \$11.1 billion net cash outflow from equity funds in February, compared with an outflow of \$0.4 billion in January. Year-to-date, equity funds have a \$11.5 billion outflow, compared to an inflow of \$24.1 billion in the first two months of 2002. The market value of assets depreciated by \$48.8 billion.

Total assets for **hybrid funds**, which invest in a mix of stocks and bonds, decreased 0.5 percent, or \$1.5 billion, to \$323.2 billion. In February, there was a \$0.1 billion net cash inflow for these funds. In 2003, hybrid funds have a \$1.2 billion inflow, while there was a \$4.5 billion inflow through this point in 2002.

Bond funds experienced a cash inflow of \$19.6 billion, while their total assets increased by \$32.9 billion, to \$1.17 trillion. The market value of bond funds assets increased by \$10.4 billion, after adjusting for net sales and reinvested dividends. The assets of taxable bond funds increased by 3.4 percent, while the assets of tax-exempt bond funds increased by 1.7 percent. The year-to-date inflow to bonds is \$32.6 billion; through last February, the year-to-date inflow was \$21.4 billion.



Assets of taxable and tax-exempt **money market funds** decreased \$38.0 billion, to \$2.24 trillion, a decrease of 2.0 percent for taxable money market funds and an increase of 1.0 percent for tax-exempt funds. Compared to a net cash inflow of \$8.4 billion through February 2002, money market funds had an outflow of \$40.8 billion in the first two months of 2003.

Liquidity Ratio

The liquidity ratio for bond and hybrid funds decreased from 6.64 to 6.06 percent, while the ratio for equity funds decreased from 4.45 to 4.32 percent (figure 4).

Weekly Flows

In March, there were outflows from equity funds of 0.6 percent of total assets, with returns of 1.3 percent. Bond funds had inflows of 0.6 percent and losses of 0.2 percent for the month.

Index funds had monthly inflows of 1.1 percent and returns of 1.5 percent. Aggressive growth funds had monthly outflows of 0.3 percent and returns of 2.1 percent. Small-cap funds had an outflow of 0.5 percent, and returns of 1.0 percent.

There were outflows from international funds in March of 1.2 percent of assets and returns of 0.6 percent. Latin America funds had outflows of 0.5 percent and returns of 4.6 percent. Japan funds had outflows of 0.4 percent and losses of 0.4 percent of assets for the month of March. Pacific funds that do not invest in Japan had outflows of 4.7 percent and losses of 1.0 percent of assets.

Capital Market Returns and Volatility


The S&P 500 ended March at 848.18, an increase of 0.8 percent from the beginning of the month. The 12-month loss was 25.1 percent at monthend. The annualized volatility for the daily return on the S&P 500 was 27.3 percent.


The 12-month average return on the Citigroup Bond Index was 11.6 percent for March. Volatility decreased to 2.90 percent (figure 8).


Price-Earnings Ratio

The macro projections for the growth of earnings of the Standard and Poor's 500 index over the next two years have decreased to 8.7 percent, but still above the 6.4 percent historical average annual growth rate. The trailing price-operating earnings ratio decreased from 20.6 in the fourth quarter to 20.3 for the first quarter of 2003, while the forward price-operating earnings ratio decreased from 17.2 in the fourth quarter to 15.4 during the first quarter (figure 9). During the first quarter the price-earnings ratio for the Standard and Poor's Small-Cap 600 Index fell to 23.0 from 26.8.

Figure 1 **Sales of Mutual Funds**











(percent of Total Financial Assets)








(percent of Total Assets)








Liquidity Ratio*






Figure 6a **Weekly Flows into Mutual Funds**

(percent of Total Assets)



(percent of Total Assets)





Figure 7 **Net New Sales By Investment Objective**

(Shaded Regions Indicate Periods of Rising Fed Funds Rate)






Capital Market Returns and Volatility










S&P500 Price-Operating Earnings Ratio







Real Rate of Return on Nonfinancial Corporate Equity


